Call for Papers – The Rise of Eurasia

Eurasia Center of Corvinus University of Budapest supported by the Magyar Nemzeti Bank, the central bank of Hungary will start its own scientific journal. The very first, special issue will concentrate on the rise of Eurasia.

By the 21st century it has become apparent that a new world order is in the making. It is characterized by the simultaneous appearance of multilateral cooperation, integration, protectionism and unilateralism. The recent geopolitical, economic, technological and social changes are the fundamental factors shaping our future and challenging the world on the level of nations and individuals alike. The epicenter of the on-going geopolitical transformation is undoubtedly Eurasia, the fusion of much diverse cultures, mindsets and policies. We are seeking submissions in the following topics:

- **GEOPOLITICS** Amid the novel coronavirus, Eurasia became the epicentres of the current geopolitical transformation processes, and the improvement can be endless. Regarding to the current global uptrend of the sustainable development goals and achievements, the further improvement of the Eurasian geopolitical liaisons can produce adequate common solution ways.
- **INFRASTRUCTURE, CONNECTIVITY AND CULTURE** China's Belt and Road Initiative is a key artery connecting the east and the west. Eurasia has a strategic transit location at the crossroads of key transport, trade and culture corridors.
- **ECONOMICS** The power of geopolitical decision-making processes can deeply determine the future development of the Eurasian economic relations after COVID-19, owing to the possibility of an even more comprehensive and fruitful cooperation.
- **MULTILATERAL COOPERATION** To recover from global crisis after pandemic requires international cooperation, therefore multilateral institutions have a key role as well in creation and execution of strategies in economical reopening and sustainable development since they are authorized to give guidance on necessary changes in all sphere including in economy, society and governance as well.
- **FINANCE** The ongoing changes and developments created the need of the revival of economic thinking, in which the central element is not only growth, but sustainability as well. Taking into consideration the deterioration in the international outlook, productivity of the Eurasian economics is the key to rebuild the predictable growth and deepen the partnerships at transcontinental level. After the financial crisis of 2008, the financial system experienced the emergence of digital and FinTech services which can

change the traditional role of the banking system and payments as well and the recent pandemic can accelerate this process.

- **EDUCATIONAL AND TECHNOLOGICAL COOPERATION** There are many factors we should consider while preparing for the years ahead: the growing importance of education, cutting-edge technologies, such as AI or robotics, ensuring social inclusion and welfare and preserving our environment and resources – just to mention of few. Today, the so-called ‘Health Silk Road’ is one of the key channels for the medical and technological cooperation in the world.

Instructions for authors

Submission of abstracts

- The abstract is limited to approximately 200 words (not including the title)
- Should accompanied by basic personal data of the author including:
 - Full name;
 - titles and
 - affiliations.

Timeline

- Deadline for submission of abstracts: 15 March 2021.
- Acceptance of the abstracts: 17 March 2021.
- Deadline for the submission of the full paper: 15 May 2021.
- Decision of the double-blind peer review process is announced: 15 June 2021.
- Submission of final version based on proofreading: 15 July 2021.
- Publication of the book: October 2021

Formal requirements of the paper:

- Manuscripts should be submitted in Word format via email.
- The length of the paper should be 30000 to 40000 keystrokes.
- The paper should include a short abstract (150-20 words).
- Only original, previously unpublished essays to be published by the Eurasia Center.
- The text must be aligned to the left margin, and without any text formatting applied.
- Tables and graphs should be sent in excel or similar format too.
- Typography: Times New Roman, 12pt, 1,5 space
- The bibliographical references must be in-text-citation
- All manuscripts must be referenced according to the APA 6th format. For more details see for example: <https://libguides.library.usyd.edu.au/c.php?g=508212&p=3476096>
- Endnotes can be used when additional information must be added the body of the text.
- The main text is followed by a reference list in ABC
- The language of the manuscript is English, British style
